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VISION IN ACTION

“Creating a Culture of Retention and Recruitment: Recapturing the Joy and Enthusiasm in Our Component”

Component members are the vital links to our existence as an organization. Like the nursing shortage, the immediate focus has changed to retaining current members and, secondly, to continue to recruit for today and tomorrow. ASPAN is not unique in its challenge with retention and recruitment of members. Like other organizations, we strive to be successful in our creative initiatives. So the most common question is, how do we retain and recruit members? In our ‘vision in action’, ASPAN recognizes the passion of our committed volunteers and leaders. Components continue to work together and reach out to non-members to join and be involved. How can we have a dramatic increase in our membership?

The Maryland Statewide Commission in Nursing Crisis recommended the education and training of nursing leaders for the purpose of retaining and recruiting nurses in the workplace. In April 2004, I had the opportunity to listen to Jo Manion, an educational nursing consultant. She was asked by the Maryland Hospital Association to offer a training program for nurse executives, leaders, and nurse managers. The focus was on the workplace, but the concepts are similar and can be applied in our components. She examined

evidence-based practice among experts and conducted a research study herself on retention of nurses in the workplace. The information that I am about to share with you highlights some important concepts and key points, which can easily be applied at the district and component levels and within an organization. I hope to stimulate your thinking. I encourage you to open your minds, thus allowing creativity necessary to influence change in practice.

How do we celebrate our successes and victories? What is the frequency? Often times we wait for those annual recognition ceremonies. This is too long to wait! Why not institute monthly or quarterly awards at the district or component levels? We have more heroes building success at the grassroots levels. Celebrating achievements and recognition of members are important steps to success.

In the culture of retention and recruitment, research studies show similar findings. Money was not a common factor that retained and recruited employees for extended time; members or employees want to feel valued and respected. They like a cohesive and enthusiastic group, where their efforts and contributions are recognized. Members value the strong connections with other members and mentors. Overall, there is a sense of community or family, a place where they belong rather than feeling like an outsider looking in. Leader's responsibilities must be focused on transforming the district, component, and organization into stable, attractive communities or families capable of magnetizing members who show an interest, commitment, and passion for perianesthesia nursing. A sense of community or family invigorates members, creates a sense of purpose, and a feeling of belonging to an integrated group.

Shaeffer and Anundsen described five phases of community development: First, the excitement phase is where you focus on possibilities. Do not expect this phase to last, otherwise you will feel disappointed. Second, the autonomy phase is crucial and difficult. You either

have common goals valued by members or you may have conflicts or illusions that can shatter the group. Third, the stability phase entails shared visions and responsibilities. Fourth, the synergy phase is when members start having fun and enjoying the connections with others. Fifth, the transformation is the reevaluation of your direction and sense of purpose. The lack of re-connection to a new purpose may lead the group to disbandment. The cycle continues in circular motion and, therefore, we need to be cognizant where we came from, where we are currently, and where we are going.

Jo Manion believed that we must learn to focus more on joy in the group, more than focusing on the problems. The joy starts from the beliefs and attitudes of individuals. Self- joy is then manifested, and finally it influences others. Manion's research findings showed major factors of joy: 37% represented the meaning of the work and purpose of involvement, 31% people and relationship, 23% self benefits, and 9% environmental factors. As a district or component, it is important to re-focus on the purpose and values of the group, educate members on ASPAN's mission, strategic plans, benefits, and how they can actively engage in meaningful ways; as leaders and members we must nurture connections and relationships. Open communication is vital in the process to know what works and does not work among the diverse membership. Lastly, we must recognize members and their achievements as often as we can. Remember that

as individuals we make a difference; as components, we have an immense power to influence change; and as an organization, our power is unlimited. The 'vision in action' is in our hands, and we must stand united to reach excellence in practice.

One of my strategic goals was the creation of a Membership Recovery Strategic Work Team (SWT). Its purpose is to critically evaluate where we are and where we are going with retention, recruitment, and recognition of members. 

This year's recipient is well known in the ASPAN and military nursing circles for her "professional activities and unwavering commitment to develop the potential of each (staff) member." She "has a profound knowledge and expertise in perianesthesia nursing and ...has the heart of a true leader." Myrna Mamaril's service to the country has not gone unnoticed. 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ASPAN Members Respond to the Challenge! Recruiter Awards for 2003-2004

Little did I realize when I challenged ASPAN members at closing ceremonies in Albuquerque to recruit one more member so we could top the 1,000 mark that we would not only meet that goal, BUT more than triple the goal!! The 2003-2004 Member-Get-A-Member campaign was an enormous success with over 3,100 new members recruited from April 1, 2003 to March 31, 2004. ASPAN's top recruiter, Denise O'Brien, was responsible for encouraging 23 of her coworkers to become members of ASPAN and MAPAN because of the increased interest in CPAN and CAPA certification. As top recruiter, Denise received an engraved plaque, a complimentary membership for one year and registration to the 2005 National Conference in Chicago. Denise Darby, RN, CAPA, Receives ABPANC's 4th Annual Advocacy Award

The 4th annual *Advocacy Award* was presented at the CPAN/CAPA Celebration Breakfast April 19, 2004 to a very surprised Denise Darby, RN, CAPA, Staff Nurse in the Day Surgery Center of Concord Hospital, Concord, New Hampshire. This award publicly recognizes a CPAN or CAPA certified nurse who exemplifies leadership as a patient advocate and is the highest accolade given to a certified nurse. Nominated by her peer, Heather B. Smith, BSN, RN, C, CPAN, the following exemplar was submitted describing only one of many instances when Denise truly advocated for a patient and his family.

When reading the application for the Advocacy Award, it seemed as though the award was written for my colleague, Denise Darby, RN, CAPA. She consistently demonstrates the art of advocacy and is a role model for all. She lives by the moral standard that "every patient deserves respect" and this is evident in her daily experiences with our patients and their families. Denise has the courage to protect and advocate for her patients, even in the event this is not the popular decision for the majority; her concern is always what is best for the patient.

Recently in the Day Surgery Center, we had a single mother of two children come in to have an orthopedic surgical procedure. Her surgery date had not been confirmed, and she arrived after making arrangements for transportation and childcare with family from out of town. Denise cared for her and assisted her with rescheduling the surgery since she could not have it as planned.

Denise supported this woman with kind words, empathy and understanding. On the day the patient returned for her rescheduled procedure, after again making arrangements for her children, the surgeon was running very far behind on her OR schedule and was considering canceling the case. On this particular day, anesthesia, due to the late hour that the case was to start, was not going to have a provider available to do this procedure. This was devastating to the patient as you can imagine.

Denise immediately intervened on the patient's behalf and spoke to the surgeon, anesthesia, nursing, the patient, and the patient's family. Once Denise explained the situation to the Day Surgery OR staff, they willingly stayed over their require time to do the case. With her interpersonal skills, advocacy

and clinical decision making skills, anesthesia and her surgeon agreed to do the case, and the family accepted the responsibility of caring for her later than anticipated.

Without Denise Darby, RN, CAPA, this patient would have had to return for a third time to have a procedure done. In a difficult situation, facing difficult conversations with surgeons and anesthesia, Denise was the mediator and advocate for our patient and it ended with a favorable outcome to all.

Denise was presented with the beautiful Lladro Nurse Statue, a \$300 cash award, plaque, and a scholarship for the next recertification fee.

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Membership Recovery: Strategic Work Team

Membership numbers in ASPAN tend to fluctuate throughout the year, as new members join, and current members choose to rejoin, or perhaps let their dues lapse for an extended period of time, and discontinue membership. New members provide a great opportunity for ASPAN to become infused with diversity, new ways of thinking, and energy. Future leaders are cultivated as the new member is invited to participate, discover and achieve through committee work, publications, and conferences. Mentoring relationships develop and ASPAN grows stronger.

But ASPAN recognizes that the foundation of our nursing organization has been secured by nurses who continue to join year after year and to provide support and encouragement in a professional, meaningful way. Active involvement in ASPAN has multiple benefits. In the first place, it is a visible sign of professional attentiveness and responsibility. It conveys a message to others that ASPAN is a specialty nursing organization that provides some answers to tough real life nursing practice situations. Members know that ASPAN responds to their concerns regarding clinical practice, sets standards and develops guidelines. Members receive educational resources, and publica-

tions, which are timely and useful in the workplace. ASPAN works to promote research and validates practice through evidence-based work.

Although there are many nurses who choose to continue membership, each year ASPAN tracks a percentage of nurses who do not rejoin. Nurses may leave the specialty practice to pursue another career choice, or to retire. There are some nurses who join only to certify or re-certify at a lower personal cost. Some nurses have lost interest, or they are ambivalent about becoming engaged in professional activities. These nurses may even continue to rejoin on the national level, but have become disillusioned on the component level. How can ASPAN help?

Dina A. Krenzischek, MAS, RN, CPAN, ASPAN President, has created a work team to explore the problem of membership recovery. She stresses the importance of each individual nurse to ASPAN's success, and to the advancement of nursing practice. Her charge is that this team finds ways to bring back members, who might be disheartened or have lost interest in membership, and to recognize and show appreciation for members who contribute to ASPAN's work at every level.

The Strategic Work Team will

identify activities and strategies, which will recognize the contributions and achievements of individual nurses. We may interview long-term members to highlight their interest and commitment. Why is membership a priority in their professional life? What motivates them with the membership and in the work of nursing? We will develop packets for perianesthesia nurses to use for recruitment opportunities for nursing in general, and for our practice in the future. We will encourage our members to speak with pride about the work of nursing, and what we do on a daily basis that makes us so special. We will help create resources for any perianesthesia nurse to use when speaking to nursing students in a classroom or clinical setting.

We will track members who have not rejoined and ask why they made this choice. Are there needs we are not meeting? What have we missed? An effort will be made to reach out to perianesthesia nurse managers who have not previously chosen to join ASPAN. They will be encouraged to join themselves, and to role model active professional membership to all staff nurses who work in their units.

ASPA is actively engaged in mentoring components who have identified leadership challenges. Membership recovery will extend

to the components, to assist in retention of long time members at the grassroots level, and to help re-energize components. We will help the component find out what problems exist and work together to strengthen them. How can ASPAN best serve the component? How can we encour-

age volunteerism? If members have joined on the component level, what keeps them from participating?

We will endeavor to recognize the component that retains the most members in a year to award the work of retaining. At the ASPAN Leadership Institute in

the fall of 2004, the SWT for Membership Recovery plans to share strategies with each component related to recruitment and retention. We accept the charge of ASPAN's energetic president, Dina, and hope to bring multiple success stories.
