It is the morning of surgery, an event that occurs at numerous hospitals around our nation on a daily basis. The admitting nurse asks the patient all of the required preoperative questions. As usual, the morning is hectic and filled with demands that keep the nurse moving at an accelerated pace -- perhaps more rapidly than the nurse feels is safe.

This patient has several questions for the nurse. A lack of understanding regarding what will transpire on this day is heard in the questions asked and is visible in his facial expression. The nurse's assessment alerts her that time must be taken to adequately answer and clarify the questions, but the OR is calling for the patient now. What should this nurse do?

Frontline Advocates

Nurses play an important role in the prevention of errors and promotion of patient safety. As a nurse, one must speak up and speak out for the patient as his or her voice. As nursing professionals, we are guided by practice standards and are subject to federal and state consumer safety laws. In 1999 the Institute of Medicine (IOM) released a report *To Err is Human: Building a Safer Health System*. IOM issued the follow-up report in 2001, *Crossing the Quality Chasm: A New Health System for the 21st Century*.

The IOM reports placed a focus

on the quality of healthcare the public is receiving when cared for in health institutions. An important relationship exists between nurses at the bedside and the delivery of patient care. Nursing professionals are "bound by an ethical code to advocate for and protect the patients under their charge."¹ Our patients expect and deserve safe, quality, and competent nursing care.

Nursing advocacy involves being the voice for our patients and it plays a vital role in keeping patients safe as they navigate through the healthcare system. Each day, nurses have opportunities to serve as patient advocates. Yet, competing priorities such as a new medical device, multiple patient assignments, new technology and computerized charting frequently take our attention away from the bedside. Unfortunately, tasks sometimes receive a higher priority than advocating for patients' needs.

Perhaps our healthcare partners

are not receptive to what nurses have to say, or they neglect to respond in a timely manner. The bottom line is: nursing's voice must be present to consistently place our patients' needs and safety first. We who have chosen to deliver care to others at their most vulnerable time do so because we care, are compassionate, and desire to make a difference in the lives of patients and families. How do we, as peri-anesthesia nurses, use our voice to advocate for patients?

Safety Champions

Your ASPAN leaders recognize the need to be active participants in creating a safe environment of care for patients. One of ASPAN's goals is to be the influential force for periesthesia patient safety, public policy and practice standards. Last April, at the 26th National Conference in Anaheim, your Representative Assembly voted to endorse a Position Statement on Perianesthesia Safety. This position statement identified characteristics that support a culture of safety: communication; advocacy; competency; efficiency/timeliness; and teamwork.

Safety advocacy translates into something tangible at your facility or area of practice. Handoff communication, site verification, medication reconciliation, and having the appropriate staffing levels are just a few areas of concern that we

can impact at a local level. Collaboration with and the inclusion of physicians, administrators and other healthcare colleagues regarding issues affecting patient care are important for creating a safe environment for patients.

Every nurse can become involved in work teams, performance improvement projects, committee work, and drafting of policies, procedures or standards. Your presence, active participation, and voice can and does make a difference in the care your patients receive. ASPAN offers

many resources to assist you in caring for patients, and your organization is dedicated to the delivery of safe, competent patient care by providing quality education, practice standards and safe practices founded in evidence based research.

Policy and Partnerships

Patient advocacy cannot occur in a vacuum. It must move beyond the bedside. Partnerships can and must be formed with our healthcare partners. Katie Horton is a registered nurse (RN) and Washington, DC health policy advocate. She states, "Successful advocates participate in coalitions of organizations with common policy interests."² ASPAN partners with anesthesia providers, physicians and other nursing colleagues on issues affecting patient safety. ASPAN is an active participant in the Council on Surgical and Perioperative Safety (CSPS). This interdisciplinary group is working together to address core

principles that affect patient safety, and I expect that you will continue to hear very exciting news from this group.

Although our circle of patient advocacy begins with a focus on our individual patient, it must extend outward to an understanding of healthcare issues on the state and national levels. Nurses must become politically savvy about healthcare policy and how that policy translates to the care delivered at the bedside. We have a responsibility to advocate for and support legislative programs that will ensure safe, quality driven environments for our patients and their families.

Raising Your Voice

Here are suggestions on how perianesthesia nurses can use our voices to advocate for patients we care for each day:

- Be compassionate and caring while communicating with the patient and his/her family
- Form a partnership with your patient; develop a plan of care for meeting personal needs and ensure the patient is an active participant in his/her care
- Maintain vigilance on behalf of the patient
- Know your ASPAN Standards, and organization/unit policies; incorporate these into practice
- Participate in committees, work teams, and performance improvement projects
- Belong to and be active in your professional nursing organization
- Use your experience, expertise, opinions and voice to advocate for improved healthcare initiatives at the local, state, federal and international levels

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



STRATEGIC WORK TEAM/COMMITTEE UPDATES

Evidence Based Practice: Committee members are participating in the review of on the Online Journal Club. An article on the journal club was written for component newsletters.

Crisis Management: This Strategic Work Team (SWT) examined internal and external forces or events that could profoundly impact ASPAN's ability to execute its mission resulting in the creation of ASPAN Crisis Management Manual.

Bylaws, Policy & Procedure, RA Standard Procedures: The Bylaws and Policies & Procedures (P&P) have been available online since November 2006. Bylaws are open to general view while P&P is password-protected for leaders' access only. The Bylaws, P&Ps, and Representative Assembly Standard Procedures will undergo a review this year.

Governmental Affairs: ASPAN is maintaining effective strategic public policy coalitions by participating with Americans for Nursing Shortage Relief (ANSR) and the American Nurses Association. ASPAN, with other ANSR members, again signed on to a letter urging Congress to appropriate funding for Title VIII Workforce Development. ASPAN continues to offer a NIWI Scholarship each year.

COMPONENT REPORT/REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

Regional Portals on ASPAN's Web site: For over a year, Region 1 has maintained a portal on the ASPAN Web site. Region 2's portal is now up and functioning. The

plan is to continue adding components/regions until all regions have portals on the Web site.

Component Financial Aid: The Component Financial Aid Form has been updated and is now available. Please contact Susan Carter, ASPAN Treasurer, at scarter@aspan.org for further information.

Component Recognition Program: A program will be developed to recognize components reaching milestone anniversaries. Look for upcoming information in *Breathline*.

SPECIALTY PRACTICE GROUP (SPG) REVITALIZATION

The current orientation/resource manual was discussed with new SPG leaders. The manual will be reviewed and revised in the coming months with input on best practices solicited from SPG leaders.

The Politics of Nursing The Nurse in Washington Internship

The Nurse in Washington Internship (NIWI) is an exciting, informative orientation to the political process in our nation's capitol. This annual program offers nurses an opportunity to learn the basics of political activism and hone political skills. We three authors had the opportunity to attend the 2007 NIWI program, held last March in Washington, D.C.

The NIWI event is sponsored by the Nursing Organizations Alliance, a consortium of specialty nursing organizations which

session included two nurses whose vision led to the first NIWI program held twenty-five years ago. Other topics included coalition building, advocacy training, mock lobbying sessions and an update from Denise H. Geolot, PhD, RN, FAAN, Director, Division of Nursing, Bureau of Health Professions of the Health Resources and Services Administration. The conference schedule concluded with a visit to "the Hill" to meet with our respective state senators and representatives.

Coalition Building

Imagine over two million registered nurses residing in the United States connecting on a particular concern, and then flooding Congress with the same message. This action would certainly get the legislators' attention and the message would be clear: this is an area of concern to healthcare experts - and lawmakers need to pay attention. Unfortunately, this degree of uniformity rarely occurs, so NIWI provided a modified approach. The attendees comprise a variety of specialty nursing practices, and many organizations have lobbyists that nurses can network with while in Washington. However, the initial phase of the NIWI process was to gather with nurses from our state and formulate a strategy for the meeting with our senator and representative.

Every participating nurse was asked to deliver the same talking points related to funding for the Nurse Reinvestment Act and the National Institute for Nursing Research. We were asked to prepare to discuss these points with the legislators and, if time permit-

includes ASPAN as a member. This year's program involved 86 registered nurse attendees representing 33 states and 35 specialty organizations. All conference attendees receive information prior to the conference to assist us in arriving prepared. Many nurses began the networking process, so essential for coalition building, prior to arriving in Washington.

Nursing Politics 101

The NIWI program began on Sunday with a gathering where we met our hosts and fellow conference attendees. The four-day agenda began with a lecture on the role of nurses in health policy. The speakers for this informative

ted, address any other pertinent concerns related to our nursing specialty. Each nurse would then leave the same written information with his or her legislator with a goal that our message would be heard and shared among the members of Congress.



to advocate for patients. Many nurses interpret that statement to apply only when the patient is in our care. But patient advocacy is effectively accomplished by engaging in fundamental lobbying efforts at the federal level, which can ensure that patients will have a licensed nurse to deliver their care.

Continued funding is essential for the Nurse Reinvestment Act to ensure that sufficient nursing faculty will be available to educate student nurses and prevent qualified nursing program appli-

cants from being turned away. This Act is necessary to keep our nation supplied with an adequate number of nurses to deliver care to an aging population.

Talk the Talk

As experts, nurses must share our professional stories with legislators. Real life descriptions of how the nursing shortage directly affects patients, such as long waits in emergency rooms, delays in care delivery, or protracted stays in the PACU due to unavailable inpatient beds or nursing staff give a powerful voice to healthcare delivery challenges.

These stories, with suggestions for potential solutions, must be told to protect and support our colleagues and patients.

ASPAN provides ongoing advocacy education and mentoring through our Governmental Affairs Committee network. The NIWI program is designed to empower nurses' understanding of and participation in the legislative arena. We urge you to become more active in nursing advocacy efforts as an ASPAN member, and consider attending a future NIWI program to learn how to become an effective voice in Washington!

Safety Alert: Handoff Communication

Providing Safe Passage through the Perianesthesia Continuum

Have you ever aggressively treated an unstable PACU patient, only to discover that buried in the preadmission workup the patient reported a similar problem with previous surgeries? When preoperative surgical patients report significant events or problems during the preadmission workup or health history, do hospitals or surgery centers have a communication reporting mechanism to ensure that future caregivers are supplied with all the pertinent information?

Just think about the number of times surgical or procedural patients transition through multiple care providers during the course of treatment. Currently, the Joint Commission is focusing on handoff communication during the transfer of care in healthcare facilities, whether the patient is being transferred to a higher level, same level, or lower level of care.

According to Joint Commission surveys, 70% of sentinel events that occurred in accredited healthcare organizations in 2005 were caused by communication problems.¹ "When a patient is handed off, caregivers need to pass on the information needed to

effectively care for that patient, such as the patient's current condition, ongoing treatment, recent changes in condition, and possible changes or complications to watch out for."¹

A standardized approach to communication between caregivers is recommended.¹ The Situation-Background-Assessment-Recommendation (SBAR) is one useful technique that can be applied in varied perianesthesia situations. SBAR allows the provider to effectively organize communications and enhance other caregivers' understanding. Many facilities have modified the SBAR technique to best fit their practice paradigm.¹

Here is an example of SBAR applied in the preoperative setting:

S – Situation: Mr. B is having a craniotomy under general anesthesia

B – Background: Preoperative vital signs and testing; history significant for obstructive sleep apnea and prior tracheostomy

A – Assessment: Patient meets criteria for difficult airway

protocol; review current vital signs; identify, report and document significant physical finds from review of systems

R – Recommendation: Closely monitor airway to prevent compromise; observe for oxygen desaturation; have an emergency tracheostomy tray readily available; advocate for possible admission to the intensive care unit overnight

A patient trusts that when he or she tells a healthcare team member about a specific problem or prior event, that this will be properly communicated to those managing the care. Ensuring that significant healthcare information is effectively communicated is imperative for keeping patients safe throughout their surgical experience. Clear, purposeful provider communications are critical to prevent harm and to ensure positive patient outcomes.

Frequently Asked Questions

The Clinical Practice Committee receives many questions via the ASPAN Web site each month. Committee members then research the answer and respond to the query. This is one frequently asked question.

Q: What is the national trend for being able to wear personal, home-laundered scrubs to work in the PACU?

A: Standard II - Environment of Care, found in the 2006-2008 Standards of Perianesthesia Nursing Practice, states: "Personnel and visitor dress codes are determined by proximity and frequency of access to operating rooms."¹ Unfortunately, no other recommendations in the Standards address attire worn by perianesthesia personnel.

In 1999, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) published a "Guideline for the Prevention of Surgical Site Infection". This guideline indicated there were no well controlled studies relating surgical site infections to laundering of scrubs. Where and how to launder scrubs was described as an unresolved matter, and no specific recommendation was issued.³ This implies that scrubs laundered at home and worn from home do not pose a

risk to patients. It also suggests that, at the end of the day, those same scrubs do not pose a health threat to the home environment.

In 2003, the CDC and the Healthcare Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee issued guidelines for infection control in healthcare facilities. Although clothing contact is not known as a significant mechanism for transmission of pathogens, the guidelines recommend control measures to prevent healthcare associated infections related to contaminate clothing founded in hygienic principles, common sense, and consensus.² When clothing becomes contaminated with blood, emesis, urine, or any other body fluid, the clothing should be immediately removed and laundered at the healthcare facility.²

The Association of periOperative Registered Nurses (AORN) does not support home laundering of surgical attire, citing a lack of evidence related to safety of healthcare workers, their families, and patients.⁴ AORN recommends that all reusable surgical attire, such as scrubs, cloth hats, and warm-up jackets be laundered after daily use in a facility approved and monitored laundry.⁴ AORN further advises that when healthcare workers are required by a facility to launder surgical scrubs at home, suggested measures for laundering the items should be observed. These include, but are not limited to: use of an automatic washer and hot air dryer; washing the scrubs separately and as the last load of wash; promoting microbial kill with a water temperature above 110° F; and the appropriate use of detergent and chlorine bleach.⁴

Regarding the use of scrubs by the perianesthesia nurse, a general

survey of clinical practice constituents from across the country revealed wide variations in opinion and practice related to scrubs. It is obvious that each healthcare institution has a tailored approach to handling scrubs based on knowledge of related research, associated costs, perceptions of staff and consumers, and cost/benefit breakdowns. Clearly, the current state of the evidence offers an expansive opportunity for studies on the implications of laundering methods. Such studies are needed to further support the decision process related to the question, "home scrubs or hospital scrubs?"


