Become a Beacon of Change for Your Practice

A lot can change in 30 years. We all recognize that 30 years is a milestone indeed, be it personal or professional. ASPAN celebrated its 30th Anniversary this past year. At the Seattle Conference in April 2011, Immediate Past President Kim Kraft challenged us to "Reinvest in Our Potential" related to our practice as clinicians, researchers, educators and managers, never once believing that we would be unsuccessful in that very wise investment. During her tenure, as well as those of other past presidents, ASPAN experienced a variety of changes that made it the dynamic and functioning organization it is today.

Change is a constant, wholesome and necessary part of growth, progress and maturation. From childhood to adulthood, we could not wait to be able to go to that first day of kindergarten, or high school, or nursing school, or to make that very first new graduate nursing career choice while feeling ready to take on healthcare, the nursing profession, the world! Thirty years ago we had as a profession just begun to see the impact of research, practice, education and technology, as well as a commitment to perioperative practice that was embraced and pushed ahead of its time by visionary ASPAN leaders. Those leaders had high hopes for this Society; they knew that this foundation was to be the start of something big!

Forward Vision

Over the past 30 years, a series of positive changes occurred that prompted a metamorphosis for this fledgling organizational membership, taking it to approximately 13,400 members strong today. Because of those who committed to make a positive change in their nursing practice, we now have practice guidelines and standards paired with a clear and compelling vision for practice, education, and research. ASPAN has references that not only guide our practice, but also provide clear direction to best practice

in institutions nationally and internationally. And to think it all started because nurses wanted to make a change, not only in their clinical practice, but also to make sure that the practice was recognized as a critical care specialty practice. ASPAN, the organization and its members, are indeed a fine example of what collective, positive change can create.

As our specialty evolved and changed from the recovery room to the post anesthesia care unit (PACU), so, too, did the nursing skill set and minimum education and experience requirements. Suddenly, critical care experience, ACLS and PALS became prerequisites to work in this specialty area. With the emergence of ambulatory surgery in the 1980s, perioperative nurses began expanding care delivery to the preoperative and same day surgery arena, Phase II PACU and extended observation.

Practice Validation

Professional certification became a goal for many a PACU nurse (and manager!). The CPAN® credential was recognized as a validation for clinical expertise, soon to be followed by the CAPA® certification. We grew from being post anesthesia nurses to perioperative nurses, broadening our practice scope and boundaries. Through it all, as a specialty, we never once lost sight of whom and what was at the center of our care model – the patient and our national practice guidelines.

ASPN is entering its fourth decade for this practice specialty. This is no time to lose momentum. We are moving toward the future impact of healthcare reform. The recent Robert Wood Johnson Foundation/Institutes of Medicine report, *The Future of Nursing: Leading Change, Advancing Health*, lists challenges we all must address to prepare for and meet the healthcare demands of the future. Key messages from

this report require a shift in our thoughts about the nursing education and preparation paradigm, and the need to embrace the changes that will help to meet those demands. In moving forward, all health professionals should practice to the full extent of his/her education and training. We must improve nursing education to better prepare nurses to lead change, and improve workforce data collection and analysis. It is expected that by 2020, 80% of all nurses should have a BSN, and that the number of nurses that have a doctorate should double. Our real challenge is to recognize that the environment has changed, and we must change as a profession in response.¹

What to Change

Recently, I read a title from a keynote speaker advertisement that said, "Change is easy ... you go first."² How appropriate that statement was for me personally, until my ASPAN colleagues, work place mentors and a particular CNO pushed me to set some attainable professional goals. Knowing I was a diploma graduate, that CNO took every opportunity to ask me about my goals. Every time she saw me, she would ask, "Chris, are you back in school yet?" Visionary ASPAN leaders guided and encouraged me to become active in our organization, fueling my desire to change. They were my beacon, providing a guiding light to achieve those goals. As a result of persistence, mentoring, coaching and faith, I attained my CPAN and CAPA certifications, completed my undergraduate and postgraduate programs, and remained active in our organization. These colleagues pushed, prodded and encouraged me to achieve educational and professional goals of which I could only have dreamed.

I challenge each and every one of you to pick one goal related to your own educational and professional development for which to strive. Plan your positive change one step and one year at a time. It really doesn't matter how long it takes - envision yourself achieving success, and then move on to your next goal. Keep a list on your end table, desk, or bathroom mirror. Stay focused and steadfast. Become a "Beacon of Change" for your practice, and you will inspire others to do the same!

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Proposed Changes to Safe Medication Administration Position Statement

A recurring question submitted to the Clinical Practice Committee involves how to safely store opioids when titrating doses in the PACU. Many ASPAN members and non-members seek guidance for handling this issue in their respective institutions. Horror stories have been reported regarding unattended syringes diverted by a family member and/or patient, or staff opening a bedside drawer to find several unidentified medication syringes left from the day before.

Over the past few months, the Safety Strategic Work Team (SWT), formerly the Safety Committee, has been writing an addendum to the *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards and Practice Recommendations 2010-2012* "Position Statement on Safe Medication Administration. "The existing position statement did not address the perianesthesia nurse's responsibility for the administration and storage of opioids and/or sedatives in the PACU setting.¹ After identifying this need, the Safety SWT began developing an addendum.

Do No Harm

Perianesthesia nurses preparing for site visits from The Joint Commission (TJC) have frequently looked to ASPAN for direction on properly securing opioids and sedatives when titrating doses of these medications in the PACU. Many of TJC Hospital 2011 National Patient Safety Goals (NPSG) are centered on the use of effective communication techniques between healthcare providers and patients. NPSG Goal 3 addresses safety when using medications by specifically identifying the need to: use two patient identifiers; label the medication with its name, strength and quantity and to complete this task while the medication is being prepared.²

In response to a need, the Safety SWT developed and recommended that the following verbiage be added to the safe medication administration position statement:

The perianesthesia nurse is responsible for the safe administration and storage of all opioids and/or sedatives.

- a) *All opioids and sedatives are labeled with the name of the medication, dose and concentration unless the entire medication (i.e., syringe volume) is given immediately after preparation by the perianesthesia nurse.*
- b) *When medication(s) is(are) prepared by someone other than the perianesthesia nurse responsible for administering the medication, a label containing the patient's name and a second identifier must be present.*
- c) *The perianesthesia nurse secures all controlled medication including those at the bedside per institutional policy.*
- d) *Any unused opioids and/or sedatives must be discarded with another licensed professional present as a witness.*

High-Alert Medications

Some other minor changes were made to the position statement to clarify the directions for handling high-alert medications. While the goal of the Safety SWT was to present the related changes to the Representative Assembly (RA) during the 30th National Conference in Seattle, unfortunately, it did not make the RA notification deadline. The changes have been submitted to the Standards and Guideline Committee for addition to the *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards and Practice Recommendation Guideline* fall 2011 review.

Celebrate Successful Practices Abstracts

“C_{elebrate Successful Practices}” is a great opportunity to present new ideas that you found to be successful and share them with ASPAN colleagues. This program offers a way for members to showcase amazing work being done at the point of care. Topics may be drawn from any successful practice related to perianesthesia nursing. For example, process improvements, patient education, leadership strategies, improved patient care and staff education are just a few of the topics you may want to consider.

Please consider submitting your successful practice to the committee for review. Abstracts will undergo an anonymous peer review process. A team of reviewers will examine your abstract for specific criteria. If your abstract is accepted, you will be

assigned to a poster presentation or invited to participate in a *Celebrate Successful Practice* PowerPoint Presentation/Discussion in a specific lecture room. In this latter format, you would join other colleagues in presenting a seven-minute PowerPoint Presentation of your successful practice followed by five minutes of questions and discussion with the audience.

Important CSP information and dates:

- **Celebrate Successful Practices** is intended to be an interactive poster session with at least one member of the project team present to answer questions during Grand Rounds. Acceptance of your poster is conditional pending this verification. If you receive a letter of acceptance you will be asked to confirm which member of the team will be present during Grand Rounds.
- Identified project leaders must be ASPAN members.
- **Abstract submissions will be accepted only via e-mail in the indicated format.**
- **Applications MUST be emailed by the October 15, 2011 deadline to be considered.** Any applications received after this date are returned and not reviewed.
- Applicants are contacted with a notification of acceptance to the poster session or PowerPoint oral presentation by February 2012.



Research and Evidence Based Practice Abstracts

The ASPAN Research Committee provides active perianesthesia nurses with an opportunity to present previously completed, unreported, original research findings from studies pertaining to all phases of perianesthesia nursing. A choice of oral and/or poster format may be selected for the 2012 National Conference presentations. Oral papers will be presented during the "Oral Research Presentations" session. Poster display and poster grand round dates have yet to be determined. Dates will be posted on the ASPAN Web site when the schedule is finalized. Poster presenters are required to be in attendance to answer questions during Grand Rounds. Posters for Research and Evidence Based Practice will be displayed together but marked to make a distinction.

A copy of the Institutional Review Board approval letter must be submitted for research abstracts. The evidence based practice format may not require such approval. Those submitting oral and poster abstracts are given the opportunity to have their abstracts published in the June issue of the *Journal of PeriAnesthesia Nursing (JoPAN)*. Past issues of *JoPAN* may be helpful for abstract development. Other helpful resources are available in the Research section of ASPAN's Web site.

If you are interested in presenting research and/or evidence based findings, please submit an application for anonymous peer review. Research and evidence based practice evaluation tools and the required formatting for each type of submission are posted on the ASPAN Web site. Acceptance of abstracts is based on scientific merit and strict adherence to submission guidelines. All project contributors receive a participation certificate. The ASPAN Research Committee thanks you in advance for your interest, participation and support of perianesthesia research!

About the Award

About a decade ago, SwedishAmerican chartered the Dr. Henry C. Anderson Quality Award to honor individuals making important improvement contribution. The award signifies a commitment to leadership, integrity, role modeling and sound judgment, and it exemplifies service distinction. In this case, the OSA Team comprises a diverse group of proactive practitioners unified by the goal to identify patients at risk for primary and secondary OSA. Team members include: John Shiro, MD, Bryan Apple, MD, Jon Michel, MD, Rick Deming, MD, Tammy Bloom, Dena Boehm, Karen Wessels, Christ Swartout, Judy Shlafer, Kay Blair and Patti Loveland.

Two years ago, the team was challenged to concentrate on the issue of OSA in perioperative patients. Healthcare providers increasingly encounter sleep apnea in patients receiving anesthesia during elective surgical procedures. The OSA team enlisted departmental support of the STOP BANG screening tool, which was imbedded in the electronic record and then used to identify patients at risk for OSA thereby enhancing patient safety. The OSA Team, nominated by the hospital's Chief Quality Officer, continues to implement patient safety measures to promote safe care delivery.

Inspirational Colleagues

Possessing a personal commitment to excellence, the team's perianesthesia nurses Tammy Bloom and Karen Wessels are scheduled to take the CAPA exam in November 2011, and Dena Boehm will take the CPAN exam at that time. 


and ultimately relates to a publication's influence. This milestone is a testament to the quality and relevance of content presented in the *Journal*.




