PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: Leading with Knowledge – Serving with Heart

Leading with knowledge and serving with heart is my theme. When I was thinking about how to influence my time as ASPAN's president, this was an idea I wanted to share with each of you. Each of us is called to share a vision and I believe continuing education is very important to maintain our place as leaders in perianesthesia nursing. But, I also wanted to share my heart, my love for each nurse that gives that piece of themselves each day to make our world a little better. As flippant and teasing as I can sometimes be, I truly view nursing as a calling. Serving with heart is at my core, and I hope, this year, you will also see it within yourself.

One reason for this theme is my longing to share ideas of servant leadership, a process that I strive for every day. I am not finished yet and, like many, I fail, pick myself up and try again. To me, it is the trying again that becomes essential.

Leadership Sphere of Influence

Leadership is described as a process whereby an individual influences a group of individuals to achieve a common goal.¹ Leading is not reserved for just managers. Many nurses need to see and understand how they lead every day. I task each of us to look at this like superhero powers and how will we choose to lead and influence. Will we use our powers for good or for evil? I think this is key, as each of us owns our persuasive power within our sphere of influence. Some spheres are wider than others, but you probably have the ability to influence your co-workers,

component members, maybe even some board members. Are you promoting or corrupting our nursing process?

By utilizing the term **process** for leadership, it becomes an action and not just a trait of a person. It is a process to affect change and requires not only leaders but also followers to get to that common goal. However, the leader then "has an ethical responsibility to attend to the needs and concerns of the followers."¹ I like to think of this responsibility in terms of servant leadership.

What is Servant Leadership?

Servant leadership was defined by Robert Greenleaf almost five decades ago. Yet, it is still utilized by many businesses, corporations, health-care systems and leaders. It speaks to the betterment of all people encouraging a different way of leadership, management, service and even spiritual growth. I wasn't totally convinced until I was asked to manage other nurses. My early years of being a manager were challenging for me and, I'm sure, for the staff whom I supervised. Everyone was frustrated, and I had a lot to learn. Then, I read about Greenleaf in my first Master's program class, and the ideas made sense. It should not be a struggle to lead if your heart is in the right place as a servant. I started my own journey.

Greenleaf states the leader is servant first. He wrote, "It begins with the natural feelings that one wants to serve, to serve first. Then conscious choice brings one to aspire to lead. The best test



is: Do those served grow as persons; do they, while being served, become healthier, wiser, freer, more autonomous, more likely themselves to become servants? And what is the effect on the least privileged in society? Will they benefit?"²

Embracing Change and Letting Go

Part of my learning included not needing to always be right. How was I making room for others to shine? I believe that is an area where each of us can look at our components and see how we can help others shine. What are you doing to invite others to share their thoughts and encourage the actions associated with these new thoughts? We cannot continue to do things the way they have always been done. Although I respect those who forged this place ahead of me, it is sometimes in the letting go that true service is given and change can occur.

Nobody really likes change. I think I can make a leap and state nurses like stability: stable patients, stable schedules, stable practice. But, sometimes, true leadership challenges the stability of a situation and suggests, "Why not?" Over the next several months, I want to explore some concepts associated with servant leadership and challenge all of us to look at how we influence those around us.

Servant Leaders Listen

Greenleaf's first characteristic of servant leadership is listening. "Servant leaders...focus on listening intently and reflectively to others in order to identify and clarify the will of a group of people."² Most of us think we are good listeners, but do you catch yourself thinking about what you are going to say in the following response? I know I do that sometimes. By doing that, we do not allow for true listening. We are called to listen with intention and empathy. We are called to be in the moment for another person. So, this month I am going to look my colleagues in the eyes, not play with my phone, not jump on their words, not shuffle papers, sigh or look at my watch. I am just going to listen with my heart open and my mind quiet. I invite you to join me. Until next time, lead with knowledge and serve with heart.

TRIBUTE TO ANNE ALLEN

ASSPAN Past President 1988-1989

ASSPAN was recently notified that Past President Anne Allen, 1988-1989, passed away. I am writing to pay tribute to this great leader, mentor, role model and my cherished friend. It is not easy to condense contributions that Anne made to ASPAN, or, how we all continue to benefit from her innovative ideas, forward thinking and editorial expertise.

Anne, while raising a family, needed some income, so she went to LPN school. While working and caring for ten children, she went to school and attained her RN ten years later in 1965. Anne thought ICU was to be her home, but discovered the 'recovery room' five years later and transferred to the post anesthesia recovery (PAR). She worked as a staff nurse, started the first pre-operative visit program, and was promoted in 1977 to the patient care supervisor of the PAR at Saint Francis Hospital in Tulsa. She worked at Saint Francis until her health forced early retirement. Her last career was as a teacher at Tulsa Technology Center.

I first met Anne at an ASPAN Board meeting. I marveled at her energy, great humor, and her command of the room when she spoke. She may have been short in stature, but one could never underestimate the "Little Lady from Oklahoma." Anne served as an Oklahoma director and then as ASPAN president, representing ASPAN at ASA, AORN, ANA and the National Federation of Specialty Nursing Organizations meetings. Anne enjoyed attending meetings out-of-town because it gave her new places to go shopping for her many shoes.

Anne spoke of her dream for publications beyond the current ASPAN newsletter *Breathline*, of which she was the first editor. She promoted the idea of ASPAN having its own journal and certification study material. As the publication chair, she edited the first published *Standards of Care*, the *Historical Record of ASPAN*, and the *National PArtiCULARS*. She always had new goals and ideas for future perianesthesia publications.

ASSPAN took a leap of faith and a risk of many dollars in contracting for production of the *Journal of Post Anesthesia Nursing*, first published in February, 1986, with Anne as its first editor. During 1984-1986, ASPAN had another major expense in setting up a certification board. Anne, hearing that we had negative financials, came up with ideas to generate funds. She proposed we cut costs by self-publishing the first edition of the *Post Anesthesia Nursing Review for Certification* and a new pocket *Redi-Ref*, of which she was both editor and contributor. Anne suggested using a small publisher in Tulsa to print the books with ASPAN, making nearly 80% profit. She continued generating ideas in selling *Calcu-Ref*, the *ASSPAN Standards* and other publications that helped the organization achieve a positive cash flow. Having raised ten children with her husband Ted, Anne knew the real value of a dollar.

Anne had a great sense of humor and loved component night where she would dress up in authentic Oklahoma heritage clothing of Native American, pioneers or cowgirl dress. My favorite component night memory of Anne was at the 1989 Orlando Conference when she, as president, dressed as a petite Snow White and was surrounded by her board members costumed as her fabled seven bearded dwarfs.

In June of 1990, Anne shared with me that she had multiple sclerosis (MS) and could not finish the edit of the *2nd Review for Certification*. She would be taking leave of ASPAN for a while. As ASPAN president, I, along with a very dedicated board, did all the editing and finished the book in 1991. As a tribute, we put Anne's name, where it belonged, as the editor. Sadly, she had to give up wearing her many high heels as the MS interfered with walking and eventually put her in a wheelchair.

Knowing Anne, I bet when she got to heaven, she negotiated giving up her wings, so she could have a pretty pair of high heels! Thank you, Anne, for all your contributions to ASPAN!





Board of Directors and RA Meeting Highlights

Anaheim, California

Jennifer Kilgore, BSN, RN, CPAN – ASPAN Secretary 2018-2020

Sunny Anaheim, California, was the location for the 37th ASPAN National Conference. ASPAN's Board of Directors (BOD) met for a preconference meeting, the Representative Assembly (RA) gathered and deliberated, and the post conference BOD meeting was held after Closing Ceremonies.

Highlights of the **ASSPAN BOD's preconference meeting** included President Susan Russell's activities and accomplishments during the past year. ASPAN membership currently stands at 14,526 members. Diane Swintek, Director for Clinical Practice, presented four position statements as developed by the Standards & Guidelines Strategic Work Team (SWT). These position statements were placed on the agenda for approval during the 2018 RA meeting.

ASSPAN has experienced an increase in sales of its educational products, including 381 On-Demand modules and 36 Certification Review bundles. ASPAN Select Seminar use is increasing, adding eight requests, with ten more requested for this summer. This year's national conference registration reflected a large number of registrants attending evening sessions. Additionally, educational sessions specific to management were very popular with attendees. A new On-Demand class, sponsored by Merck and offering 1.5 contact hours, is currently available on the ASPAN Web site, free to ASPAN members.

Recognizing that safety is woven into the fabric of ASPAN, a group will be working to update the *Safety Toolkit*. Katrina Bickerstaff, Immediate Past President, discussed the establishment of Fellow of the American Society of PeriAnesthesia Nurses (FASPAN) program. The

ASSPAN BOD was excited to approve this prestigious program. The inaugural class of Fellows was inducted during Opening Ceremonies in Anaheim.

The Gold Leaf Component of the Year Award application has been revised to provide greater transparency for all component applicants. The BOD voted to approve an ASPAN booth presence at the Magnet Conference held in Denver, Colorado, in October 2018. The Leadership Development Committee has been renamed the Emerging Leaders Committee. This is an effort to emphasize developing future leaders for ASPAN from within our organization.

Ninety-two duly credentialed representatives constituted the 2018 ASPAN **Representative Assembly**. The election of 2018-2019 ASPAN Board members, lively discussion among RA members surrounding approval of four position statements, along with presentations provided by ASPAN members and leaders, filled the day. The four position statements – Medicinal Marijuana, Opioid Stewardship, Gender Diversity and CPAN/CAPA Certification -- were approved by the RA, and will be included in ASPAN's *2019-2020 Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements*.

During the **ASSPAN BOD's post conference meeting**, dialogue included exploring ideas for the Leadership Development Institute, and the possibility of future national conference changes, including scheduling. The Board voted in favor of broadening the availability of ASPAN Select Seminars educational products to not only components, but to hospitals, surgery centers and clinics.

Clinical Practice Hot Topic

Narcotic Waste in the PACU

Diane Swintek, MSN, RN, CPAN – Director for Clinical Practice

The Clinical Practice Committee receives many questions via the ASPAN Web site each month. Committee members then research the answer and respond to the query. This month, the questions are about opioid waste.

Q. *What is the standard practice for narcotic waste in PACU? Is it after the patient leaves PACU? If so, how many hours of stay? What happens to the opiates that are left from the dose removed from the medication dispensing cabinet?*

A. This specific issue is not addressed in the 2017-2018 *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements*.¹ Instead, this process and policy should be developed in conjunction with your facility pharmacy and administration. Regulatory requirements should direct the appropriate administration and wasting of medications. Now more than ever, hospitals are being held accountable for preventing diversion of opioids in all areas. Facility pharmacy staff look at what medications were dispensed from automated dispensing machines, when they were administered, how much as indicated on the electronic medical record, what was wasted and when.

Any time there is medication remaining, it must be wasted before the patient leaves the care area. Discrepancies pop up immediately on any automated dispensing machine, and most facilities require discrepancies to be resolved each shift. It is a very tight process and is meant to protect patients and staff. It is important to know and understand the policy in your hospital regarding medication administration and wasting medications, and ensure your entire team understands and adheres to the process.

The 2017-2018 *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements* has “A Position Statement on Safe Medication Administration.”² One statement in this position statement speaks to safely securing the medications and disposing of any unused controlled substances with another registered nurse as a witness. In addition, the ready access to drugs of abuse in the perianesthesia area triggered the ASPAN Standards and Guidelines Strategic Work Team in 2011 to create “A Position Statement on Substance Abuse in Perianesthesia

Practice,”³ approved by the Representative Assembly in 2012. This position statement recognizes that perianesthesia practice, similar to other high acuity areas, involves physical, emotional and/or mental stress that can cause the nurse to turn to substance abuse. Recognizing the symptoms of an impaired nurse is every nurse’s responsibility. Keeping the patient and each other safe is of paramount importance.

Personal Perspective

Recently, I attended two different educational programs: an employer session and one to celebrate *PeriAnesthesia Nurse Awareness Week*. Both had sessions on opiate diversion. I was startled by the information and statistics quoted. But, I should not have been surprised. Twice in my 35+ years of nursing, I have unknowingly worked with nurses who diverted opioids. I had no idea. The course noted that there is no usual profile for the person who will divert opioids. I found that to be true. My facility does have a policy and we take wasting of unused narcotics very seriously. Beside the Pyxis®, we have a disposal device for the absorption of liquid narcotics and tablet doses. I have been entrusted by my employer with the responsible administration and disposal of controlled substances – a trust maintained for over 35 years.





