Welcome to a new year for ASPAN! It is my honor to lead this amazing group of perianesthesia professionals through 2019 into 2020. You are one of over 14,000 nurses who subscribe to the importance of this professional organization. Hopefully, you have been able to take advantage of the many educational opportunities or the clinical practice resources ASPAN offers to elevate practice. The strength of ASPAN in offering these opportunities and supporting perianesthesia research and standards is primarily because of our volunteers. Over the past year, I have been privy to the extraordinary work of all the volunteers within ASPAN. WOW, is all I can say for the breadth of issues ASPAN addresses.

ASPN Volunteers

To meet the need, there are 272 nurses involved within ASPAN who volunteered last year in some capacity. The time commitment of these positions varies greatly from one hour per month to two hours per week. Here is a breakdown of the variety of areas in which volunteers are used within ASPAN:

- 13 strategic work teams (SWT)
- 7 committees
- 8 specialty practice groups (SPG)
- 21 liaisons
- 14 Board of Directors members
- 3 editors
- 2 historians
- 1 parliamentarian

Overall, there are 492 positions within these groups filled by volunteers. The beauty of these groups is the variety of experiences within the groups as nurses and, specifically, as perianesthesia nurses. The different roles the volunteers play adds diversity to each team.

Willingness to Participate Opportunities

Sharing your talents with ASPAN is easy to do. In the fall, just submit a Willingness to Participate (WTP) form online on ASPAN's website, and then just wait for

your assignment. Volunteers are assigned to a committee/SWT based on their selections and role in perianesthesia nursing, and the number of members who volunteer. You will be notified of your assignment in 2020 prior to National Conference, so there is a delay once you put in your WTP form. Elizabeth Card, vice president/president-elect, has written an article in this issue that describes further the great opportunities for growth within the WTP choices.

This past year had both good news and bad news status for these volunteer opportunities. MANY nurses volunteered, which is good. But that meant not everyone got all their choices. How do you know which assignment is best for you? Just follow your heart. You know what interests you and those things at which you excel. Chances are, those are your strengths. So, use them to benefit ASPAN. If, after a year, your interests change, you can fill out the WTP for a different committee next year. Every volunteer must fill out a WTP every year.

Board of Director Volunteers

The Board of Directors is also part of the volunteer force for ASPAN. They are called upon to lead this specialty for the good of ASPAN. All the members of the board began their journey many years ago by volunteering at the component level. This led to a natural progression to leadership within their component and beginning to dabble at the national level. First, they became committee/SWT members and learned the ropes of the organization. Many were then asked to become leaders within that committee/SWT. The next logical step was to run for a position on the Board of Directors.

Volunteering and stepping up takes commitment and courage to risk being on such a public stage without a guarantee of success. I ran and lost two times for a Board position before becoming successful. I admire the poise of the candidates and the dedication they demonstrate to ASPAN. The success of this organization depends on the strength of the volunteers, and there are MANY of those. Thank you for sharing your strengths with ASPAN.

Clinical Practice Hot Topic

Safe Medication Practices

The Clinical Practice Committee receives many questions via the ASPAN website each month. Committee members then research the answer and respond to the query. This month, the questions are about safe medication practices.

Q. How long do you hold patients after narcotic administration, including po pain medications?

Q. How long do we keep a patient following Narcan administration?

A. It has become more challenging to manage a patient's pain in light of the current opioid crisis. Certainly, patient safety concerns take priority over pharmacological interventions in treating pain. Safe medication administration is usually associated with opioid medications. But, opioids are not the only class of medications that require close monitoring after administration. We may need to correct hypertension, hypotension or an arrhythmia as well. These interventions also require knowledge of the medication action, onset, peak effect and duration.

Opioid Medications

Planning for pain management begins with pre-admission patient contact. This is the time to discover coping mechanisms related to pain, substance abuse and previous exposure to opiates. It is essential to know about prior opiate use, as well as if the patient is opiate naïve, in order to plan for safe medication administration in the PACU.

In the *ASPN 2019-2020 Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements*, Position Statement (PS) 4 – Safe Medication Administration, provides guidance for safe medication practices. One recommendation states each perianesthesia nurse must be aware of the “pharmacokinetics of various medications that cause respiratory depression, unwanted sedation and alterations in hemodynamic stability.”¹ PS 4 also advises each nurse to be familiar with the medication policy at his/her institution, ideally created with input from physicians, pharmacists and nurses.¹

Length of stay is determined by the amount and type of medication, timing when given, patient response, medication half-life and peak, monitoring capabilities of the accepting unit and, lastly, *cumulative* effects. “Current recommendations suggest at

least 30 minutes of observation following the last dose of sedative and/or opiate medication unless transferring to the same level of care or a unit with comparable monitoring capabilities.”¹ The frequency in which an opiate or sedative can be administered in Phase 1 PACU requires extra diligence due to cumulative and peak effects.

Unwanted Sedation

Cumulative effects may lead to unwanted sedation if not monitored closely. Practice Recommendation (PR) 11 - The Prevention of Unwanted Sedation in the Adult Patient, reminds us that sedation can happen at anytime during treatment with opioid medications. If left undetected or untreated, it can produce respiratory depression. PR 11 recommends a multimodal approach to pain management, using a sedation monitoring scale, and identification of risk factors that may indicate a patient is at higher risk for unwanted sedation.²

If the unwanted sedation progresses to respiratory depression or compromise, then rescue medication may be needed. If the patient requires Narcan, we must know the half-life and extent of action, which is dose dependent. With Narcan, the half-life is anywhere from 30 to 90 minutes, depending on the speed of liver metabolism.³

The current recommendation is to monitor a patient two hours following a reversal agent, to ensure that unwanted sedation or respiratory depression do not recur.²

EBP or Research Project Finished? Disseminate!

You have worked on an evidence-based practice (EBP) project or research study and have implemented the change or completed data analysis. Congratulations!

But...your work is not done yet.

Dissemination of results is a critical step in the process. This may feel like the most daunting part. Remember, you have completed very challenging work, and it deserves to go public to inform others in perianesthesia nursing practice.

Internal or External Dissemination?

Dissemination to colleagues can be internal or external. Both are desired. The route depends on the type of dissemination. Examples of internal dissemination include an oral or written presentation at a shared governance or unit practice council, during the annual EBP/research day, or in an organizational newsletter. External dissemination can be at a district, component, national, or international conference or in a publication. Dissemination can be a policy, an oral presentation, a poster or an abstract to an article.

Format of Dissemination

The form, content, and process will change, based on the type of dissemination and your audience, so those are your first decisions. You may wish to start with a friendly internal audience and then progress to external dissemination. Find out if there is a required format or template for your slides, article or poster. Elements to include will be based on whether you are presenting EBP, quality improvement or research. For instance, EBP abstracts may include the following sections: introduction, identification of the problem, EBP question, evidence, implementation, outcomes and implications for perianesthesia nursing. The ASPAN website, under the Research tab, includes abstracts for the posters and presentations from past national conferences.

Creating an Impressive Poster

There are many PowerPoint templates that can be found online when you are making a poster. Your organization may have one with its logo. There is an art and science to creating an effective poster to communicate your project in an aesthetically pleasing and poster session-ready format. The title is critical. It needs to reflect the project content and make the reader want to know more. Wordiness, paragraphs, a lack of graphs and pictures, and using a small font are just some of the pitfalls that interfere with your message being absorbed by your audience.

During a poster session, attendees are standing a few feet away and spend a brief time with you and your poster. Practicing the delivery of important points will bolster your confidence and effectiveness during a presentation. Many poster presenters have printed copies of their poster and reference list. At a minimum, your contact information should be available to your audience. Poster tips are also available on the ASPAN website.

How Do I Disseminate to a Journal?

Submission to a peer-reviewed journal, such as the *Journal of PeriAnesthesia Nursing*, will be framed according to the Author Guidelines. These can usually be found on the webpage of the journal and give you a playbook on authorship of a submission. If you have already disseminated via oral or poster presentation, you can use the content as a starting point for an article. Work with your team, get started, and hold each other accountable to deadlines. Before you know it, a manuscript will be written!

An important part of dissemination is review and rehearsal. Have a perianesthesia nursing colleague look over your work to see if it makes sense to them and is easy to read. Typographical errors are very distracting, and difficult for you as the author to sometimes detect. The review of your poster, presentation, and manuscript by colleagues will return great dividends.

Now, go forth and disseminate!



Board of Directors' and Representative Assembly Meetings Highlights

Nashville, Tennessee, a flourishing city filled with history, excitement, music, delicious food, and rich charm, was the setting for ASPAN's electrifying 38th National Conference! It is an honor to serve as ASPAN's secretary. Please allow me to report on the meetings that occurred during National Conference.

ASPA's preconference Board of Directors meeting was held on Saturday, May 4, prior to the week's festivities and educational sessions. Diane Swintek, ASPAN's Director for Clinical Practice, presented a new practice recommendation, "Promotion of Normothermia in Adult Patient," which was endorsed by the ASPAN Board of Directors. This was created in response to questions submitted to the Clinical Practice Committee from perianesthesia nurses asking questions about temperature management. The Nominating Committee, led by Immediate Past President Susan Russell, presented the slate of candidates for 2019-20. Susan Russell suggested ASPAN may benefit from restructuring the Nominating Committee. ASPAN's Treasurer, Deborah Bickford, gave a detailed financial report, which included an audit as presented by an independent firm. ASPAN is solvent and strives to be good stewards of ASPAN monies.

The Board voted to increase the amount of scholarship funds for the National Conference Attendance award effective with the 2020 scholarship brochure. ASPAN has an established policy on Conflict of Interest, which includes speaker restrictions. An agenda item was presented to remove names of organizations that

may compete with ASPAN. ASPAN's goal is to be the premier provider of education for perianesthesia nurses. After discussion, ASPAN's Board voted to maintain current policy as written to protect the Society's best interests.

ASPA's Representative Assembly (RA) was called to order on Sunday, May 5, and the 92 duly credentialed representatives had the opportunity to vote on candidates and resolutions. ASPAN President Regina Hoefner-Notz presented a *State of the Society* report describing numerous ASPAN activities and initiatives established over the past year. Discussion on the normothermia practice recommendation led to pulling Resolution 2019-02 to allow the author to provide some additional detail prior to a vote at a later date. The RA approved Resolution 2019-01's revisions to ASPAN's Position Statement 10: *A Position Statement on Care of the Perinatal Woman*.

At the close of National Conference, ASPAN's newly installed Board of Directors gathered for the postconference meeting on Friday, May 10. For many years, ASPAN's publication, *Redi-Ref for Perianesthesia Practices*, has been useful to perianesthesia nurses. The last version was published in 2015. The Board discussed the idea of exploring, updating and possibly republishing this valuable publication. There was also discussion about the annual component newsletter contest. Several ideas were offered and will be explored by the Publications Strategic Work Team in the coming months.


