Highlights from the ASPAN Board of Directors Meetings and Representative Assembly

Denver, Colorado was the site of ASPAN's 42nd National Conference. It might have taken us a couple extra years to get to Denver, but it was definitely worth the wait! The energy and enthusiasm of those in attendance was palpable.

ASPA Board of Directors Preconference Meeting

The ASPAN Board of Directors (BOD) met on Wednesday, April 26, for the preconference BOD meeting. Votes taking place included:

- Amending the Treasurer job description to be inclusive of all Executive Board members during budget review
- Approving the ASPAN 2022 Financial Audit and 990 Form. There was a lively discussion related to speaker compensation, fiduciary responsibility, equity, and equality. This topic will be brought back for a vote after further research on the topic takes place
- Approving changes to the Meeting Minutes Policy #03-120, adding requirements for minutes of Committees, Strategic Work Teams (SWTs) and Specialty Practice Groups (SPGs)

Other topics on the agenda included:

- Treasurer Lori Silva presented the current financial statement, which prompted additional discussion on ideas for cost-saving measures which could be implemented. Vice President/President-elect Alphonzo Baker brought forward concerns from the Development SWT related to scholarships. After much discussion, he will take the BOD's comments back to Development SWT for their consideration in making revisions to the policy
- Immediate Past President Jennifer Kilgore brought forth a recommendation from the Component Revitalization SWT (CR SWT) to hire a professional consultant to evaluate our organization to determine where we are, where we can grow, and the best options for our structure. The BOD, after much discussion, agreed this was a reasonable idea and referred the matter back to CR SWT to determine the scope and obtain

quotes. It will then be brought back to the CR SWT to vote

- Regional Director Region 3 Deborah Moengen presented the work of the Onboarding BOD Subcommittee, including an updated policy list for regional director transition, a timeline of activities/events, and a revised transition checklist. She also reviewed the onboarding handbook created by the mission directors. Further work will be done to ensure the onboarding materials for all officers is updated and provides a clear path for the new directors to follow

Representative Assembly Meeting

Thursday, April 27, brought the ASPAN Representative Assembly (RA) together in person for the first time in three years. The 94 duly credentialed representatives constituted a quorum. This number is significant as it meant we had two representatives in attendance from EVERY component. This is something we have not had in several years, including prior to the pandemic. The RA proceeded as follows:

- Candidates for office presented their platforms, and the members of the RA cast their ballots in the election
- There were no initiatives on the agenda this year
- President Connie Hardy Tabet presented a summary of her year's activities
- Treasurer Lori Silva presented the ASPAN financial report and entertained questions
- The CR SWT presented the results of the survey conducted in 2022. This was followed by extensive discussion on topics that were identified, such as changing membership time frames, instituting automatic renewal, eliminating component membership requirements, and more. The discussion continued into the Component Presidents' Luncheon and resumed after the break. Members were provided a QR code to submit additional comments and questions. This data will be compiled and taken back to the CR SWT for further review and discussion of best practice opportunities

- Approving a new American Organization for Nursing Leadership (AONL) Advocacy Day scholarship award. This will replace the Nurse in Washington Internship award, as that program was discontinued by the organizers
- Director for Clinical Practice Melissa Davidson presented an introduction letter for ASPAN's liaisons to

be sent to the organizations we interact with to foster more collaborative relationships. The BOD voted to endorse this letter unanimously

- President Alphonzo Baker reviewed the committee and SWT assignments for the upcoming year
- A discussion was held concerning continuation of the ASPAN Insights program and potential topics to be presented, as well as additional opportunities to ensure component leadership needs are addressed and enhance member engagement

As always, all ASPAN members are welcome to attend the BOD meetings. It is a great opportunity to see the work going on to make ASPAN the premier organization for perianesthesia nursing excellence.

Clinical Practice Hot Topic: ASPAN Standards

Q• *I have an issue I believe needs to be addressed in the ASPAN standards. How do I submit it?*

A• In 1984, the American Society of PostAnesthesia Nurses (ASPA), as a professional nursing organization, established the first set of standards guiding postanesthesia nursing. Along with ASPAN's evolution to the American Society of PeriAnesthesia Nurses, updating the standards became a process which also evolved over the years.

Perianesthesia nursing is a specialty, but we are dealing with the same issues as many other nursing specialties. This has led to collaboration with other professional organizations to develop position statements supporting such topics as investigation of waste anesthetic gases and promoting civility.¹ How do these collaborations happen? And how do new practice recommendations get created?

Traditionally, the ideas for practice recommendations and position statements come from the professionals within our organization. The questions submitted through the website to the Clinical Practice Committee are trended and shared with the Standards Strategic Work Team (SWT). This team of dedicated ASPAN members reviews the questions and evaluates if something in the current edition of the *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements* needs to be reworded to make it clearer or if it needs more evidence to support the recommendation.

The ASPAN president may also create strategic work teams and appoint members to work on a specific issue. For example, this was how the collaborative position statements on workplace civility and waste anesthetic gases were created.

To ensure we are following a process for identifying issues, the ASPAN Board of Directors (BOD) has cre-

ated a policy to address how to move these items forward. Any person who has identified a change they wish to see in our *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements* can submit a written request with supporting evidence to the director for clinical practice. This will then be evaluated by the BOD and sent to the Standards SWT for review and possible development of a new position statement or practice recommendation, or an addition to a current section in the Standards.

ASPN is strong because we listen to our members and develop evidence-based standards to support our nurses in their practice. The *Perianesthesia Nursing Standards, Practice Recommendations and Interpretive Statements* are published every two years, but the SWT's work is ongoing. They work diligently throughout each year to add evidence and support to these standards, as well as

develop new practice recommendations and position statements supporting our nurses. With the questions submitted by our nurses, we can identify current practice trends and enrich the publication.

From the Heart

ASPAN core values are the heart of what we practice. We care for individuals who are at their most vulnerable. I have been a perianesthesia nurse for over 21 years. So much has evolved with patients getting discharged the same day, who we used to keep at least overnight.

I have been working in Tucson, Arizona. I received a patient later in the day who had her ankle fracture repaired with a block and no sedation. Her neighbor was her ride home. This patient was wide awake when she arrived in the PACU. The patient said that her elderly husband was in the hospital, and she was going home alone. Her neighbor would be checking on her. I was curious to how she had fractured her ankle in the first place. I noticed bruises on her arms and chest. The patient proceeded to tell me that she had "fainted" and fell between the washer and dryer in her home. Because of the block, her mobility was impaired. I didn't feel she was safe to be home alone that night. I felt if she were to get up to use the restroom, she could easily fall. In discussion with her neighbor, we arranged for the patient to

stay at the neighbor's home. In the follow-up phone call, the patient was thankful to have felt safe after her procedure.

Part of fully caring for our patients, who we send home, is to understand what and where they will be recovering. This was an elderly woman with no support in her home. She would not be able to easily care for herself and her activities of daily living. She could easily become further injured. I voiced my concerns with the neighbor. The neighbor understood my concerns. After an ongoing discussion, the neighbor arranged for the patient to stay in her home. On a follow-up phone call, the patient had a safe recovery and did not injure herself.

This demonstrated to me we need not only be aware of caring for our patients in our setting, but we need to determine the patient has a safe environment to finish their recovery.

The High Cost of Staying Silent

Crucial conversations are discussions that occur when emotions are high, stakes are important, and opinions vary.¹ These conversations are essential in the workplace and for overall well-being and nurse health because they allow for effective communication, problem-solving, and relationship building.

It is not a new idea to suggest effective communication is critical in the workplace, especially in healthcare settings where lives are at stake. Nurses must be able to communicate effectively with colleagues, patients, and families to ensure quality care. Crucial conversations provide an opportunity for nurses to express their concerns and opinions in a safe and respectful manner. This can lead to a better understanding of the situation and a shared goal to improve patient care.

We may know it as “workplace drama” - when conflict arises due to differences in opinions, values, and personalities. Ignoring or avoiding these conflicts can lead to a toxic work environment, decreased job satisfaction, and ultimately, burnout. By having crucial conversations, nurses can address conflicts and find solutions that work for everyone involved. When nurses feel unsupported, unheard, or undervalued, they may experience feelings of frustration, anger, or even hopelessness. These negative emotions can have a significant impact on mental health and may lead to burnout or turnover.²

When nurses feel valued and their concerns are heard, they are more likely to feel engaged and satisfied in their work, so they stay.²

Seeking mastery in communication increases autonomy, empowering the development of strong relationships with colleagues, patients, and families. This can create a positive work environment that promotes collaboration, trust, and teamwork, and enhances the sense of purpose.

There are some great tips we can start implementing right now to improve our communication and conflict resolution skills. One of the most important things we can do is practice empathy and active listening. This means really listening to what the other person is saying, clarifying any misunderstandings, and acknowledging their feelings. We can do this by maintaining eye contact, nodding, and asking open-ended questions to better understand their perspective.

Another tip is to use "I" statements when expressing concerns or opinions during a crucial conversation. Instead of saying "you're not listening to me," we could say



"I don't feel heard when I share my concerns." This helps to avoid blaming or accusing and keeps the conversation focused on the problem rather than the person.³ Finally, it's important to seek feedback, and if needed, agree on follow-up.³ Feedback can help identify areas for improvement and build confidence in our communication and conflict resolution skills.

Crucial conversations are essential in the workplace and for overall well-being and nurse wellness. By effectively engaging in crucial conversations, we can create a positive work environment that promotes collaboration, trust, and teamwork. Staying silent or “letting it go” comes at a cost to our overall well-being, our sense of autonomy, mastery and purpose - and it can cost us the best outcomes we desire for our patients.


